Hedgehogs on the Park

Have you seen any hedgehogs on Delamere

Hopefully many of you will answer 'yes', as we are fortunate to have some of these lovely animals living amongst us. They have been quite active during the last month or so, feeding themselves up as they prepare for hibernation until next spring.

Hedgehogs can travel long distances each night in their search for food. Those that have been seen in The Dell for example could possibly be the same ones seen around Long Acre.

The weather has been quite mild recently (mid-November as I write this) and not really cold enough to trigger hibernation, so keep an eye out, you may still spot one or two around at night.

When it does get colder, hopefully they'll all be safely tucked up in their winter nest, a leaf-lined chamber they will have made in a quiet place such as an overgrown shrubbery with ground ivy / undergrowth, or in a pile of discarded branches or logs what we humans might call an untidy area! Perhaps you've bought a pre-made hedgehog box and put it in your garden, or even made one yourself - well done you!

But did you know that hibernation is not continuous? Occasionally a hedgehog may wake up in the winter for a short time and may go wandering, possibly in search of food. There won't be many slugs about so if you do see one you could put a small bowl of cat food out, ideally in a place where cats can't get at it!



Hedgehogs are in severe decline, however, and in July this year hedgehogs were officially classified as 'vulnerable to extinction' in the Red List for British Mammals. One of the reasons is loss of habitat – they need undisturbed shrubbery, undergrowth, piles of branches and logs; places where they can rummage and forage for food, corridors to enable them to travel safely from place to place, and places to hibernate.

Places such as this already exist on the Park and we should aim to protect them by adopting appropriate gardening practices. There are so many simple things we could all do in our gardens that would benefit our lovely co-residents. At this time of year, the best thing is NOT to be tidy and leave undergrowth undisturbed - hedgehogs need plenty of leaves and brash!



News from the Trustees

Dear Resident,

We hope you are staying safe and well during this lockdown. We would like to take this opportunity to remind you if you need any help please do not hesitate to contact the office who have a list of volunteers who may be able to offer assistance.

Just in case you missed the previous announcement the winners of the Fitzsimmons Trophy for 2020 were Isobel Nicholson and Marjorie Ruchat for looking after the flowers beds around The Park on a regular basis.

You may have noticed the Lagoons which are looking fantastic as the Gardeners have been planting shrubs in this area and will be planting elsewhere on the Park.

One of the biggest annual tasks for the gardening team is the collection of autumn leaf fall, which is substantial on an estate like ours. Aidan & Chris have done a fantastic job this year with the aid of a new piece of kit, a large commercial leaf 'hoover'. Unfortunately, it has broken down twice recently which has caused a delay in clearing away the large leaf piles the guys create ready for 'hoovering' up. Even if these leaf piles are left for a few days they will always be cleared away.

NB CWAC are responsible for clearing the road gutters, although in the course of their work Aidan & Chris often clear them of leaf fall. We have sent a request to CWAC to come out and clear the road gutters; please feel free to send in your own request for them to do so, then maybe they'll come out before Christmas.

Tree surgeons have been in the Park felling dead or diseased trees and will be back for two days in December to do more tree work. We realise that such work is noisy for Residents who live near to where the work is being carried out, however the work is years overdue and a necessary task on an estate like ours. New trees will be planted in 2021 to replace those which have been removed.

Many of these owners and their well loved dogs can be found assembling on the Green for fun and chats around 9.30a.m. most mornings. A picture depicts just a few of them and I have included some more individual histories.

MILLY is a 5 ½ year old standard Poodle owned by *Isobel*. She is very elegant and ladylike. She has a sister called **MABEL** who sometimes comes to visit with her. **MILLY** practically lives in the car, when taken out for rides by her owner she refuses to get out when she returns home and just sits there.

Mah - Jongg

Oh what a dull day
For Mah Jongg we are still unable to play

This game is rumoured to be 2,500 years old, however the real history is shrouded in mystery. It is thought to have originated in the 19th Century in certain provinces near Shanghai where there are to be found links between the traditional rules of Mah Jongg and another popular game Mah-tige (hanging horse) as this game uses a similar set of tiles.

It is more popular than Chess in China. The original tiles were made of ivory, now they are largely made of wood. In the 1920's the British and Americans in China enjoyed playing this game and the rules evolved again. This was because the existing game was a little bit difficult for Westerners.

Living in Shanghai at this time was an American gentleman by the name of Babcock. He began exporting sets back to the United States. The copyright was sold and rules altered to suit the American market.

In the 1940's Mah Jongg was banned in China after the Communist revolution as it was seen as a pastime of the bourgeoisie. During this period, players were even arrested if found to be playing. This ban was finally lifted in 1985.

Here on the Park we play the American version with Jokers. This is because it was introduced to some of the present Mah Jongg Club Members by Nikki and Lester Bowman who had previously lived in America. At that time the Community Group granted Nikki a loan which enabled her to purchase four Mah Jongg sets from the USA. This money was eventually repaid by the Mah Jongg Group.

Today Mah Jongg is a favourite game played around the world.
